

<u>Definition:</u> Chicago or "Turabian" style is commonly used in history or government papers. This style allows for a notes-bibliography system.

Citations:

Book (single author)

Author. Title. Publication City: Publisher, Year.

Carter, John. Dinosaur and Cousin Armadillo. Austin, TX: PandBooks, 1990.

Two or more authors

Author and Author. Title. Publication City: Publisher, Year.

Broer, Lawrence R. and Gloria Holland. *Hemingway and Women: Female Critics and the Female Voice*. Tuscaloosa: U of Alabama Press, 2002.

Website

Author. "Article Title." Website Title. Date. URL

Welsh, Teresa. "Should We Send Humans to Mars?" *U.S. News & World Report.* August 6, 2012. http://www.usnews.com/opinion/articles/2012/08/06/should -we-sendhumans-tomars.

Newspaper

Author. "Article Title." Newspaper Title (Publication City), Date.

Anthology

Author. "Chapter Title." Title. Publication City: Publisher, Year.

Shell, Marc, ed. American Babel: Literatures of the United States from Abnaki to Zuni. Cambridge, MA: Harvard UP, 2002.

Journal Article

Author. "Article Title." Journal Title Volume, Number. (Date): Pages.

McDonough, Colleen M. "Mammalogists' Determinants of Aggression in Nine-Banded Armadillos." *Journal of Mammalogy* 75, no. 1 (1994): 189-98.

ENDNOTE / FOOTNOTES

The fundamental identification mark of Chicago Style is its form of documentation. Footnotes / endnotes are a part of the documentation style. Go to the REFERENCES Tab and click INSERT FOOTNOTE or ENDNOTE.

For example:

Omnivore's eat a variety of meals. Here is the number you are citing for the notes.

All notes will look like this.

A note citation will then follow at the bottom of the page where the source is used. Use the full citation the first time:

1. John Carter, Dinosaur and Cousin Armadillo (Austin, TX: PandBooks, 1990), 6.

After that, shorten it:

2. John Carter, Dinosaur, 6.
