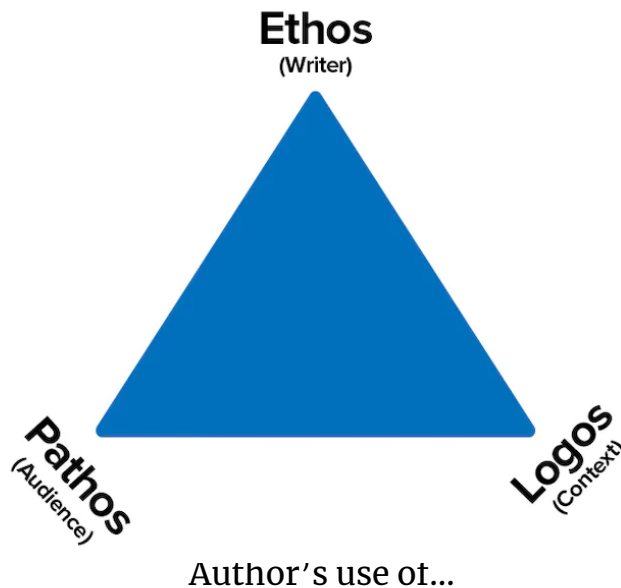

Definition: A synthesis essay calls for you to both compare and contrast two texts as well as respond to a synthesis question. This requires a rigorous analysis as well as a deep comprehension of both texts.

Rhetorical Critique:



Pathos	Ethos	Logos
The audience feels an emotional connection to the writing.	The writer is credible and generates work with great style/ tone.	The context of the work includes factual evidence or logical arguments.

Kairos:

Much like Ethos, Logos, and Pathos, Kairos connects the text to a specific time and place. This means that the text is relevant only to that time and place, often leaving room to critique outdated information or establishing great credibility for particularly relevant information.
