A verb is a word used to describe an action. A verb tense changes the verb to denote the time in which it took place. There are three main categories of verb tenses: past, present, and future. There are also four subcategories of these tenses: simple, perfect, continuous, and perfect continuous.

- **Past tense** expresses an action that has already occurred.
- **Present tense** expresses an action that is occurring right now.
- Future tense expresses an action that will occur in the future.

In each subcategory of these main tenses, you may need to use the **past participle** form of a verb, which is a modification of the **base** form. For **regular verbs**, add the suffix "-d" or "-ed" to the end of the base form of the verb. For **irregular verbs**, a vowel or vowels will change in the middle of the word (ex: run - ran), A suffix will be added (ex: drive – driven), or both (freeze – frozen).

<u>Simple</u>

- In simple past, you use the past participle form of the verb.
- In **simple present** you use the base form of the verb.
- In simple future you add <u>will</u> before the base form of the verb.

<u>Perfect</u>

- In **past perfect**, you add <u>had</u> before the past participle form of a verb.
- In **present perfect**, you add <u>have</u> before the past participle form of a verb.
- In future perfect, you add <u>will have</u> before the past participle form of a verb.

<u>Continuous</u>

- In **past continuous**, you add a "<u>to be</u>" verb in agreement with your subject before the present participle ("-ing") form of a verb. Both regular and irregular verbs will end with "-ing."
- In **present continuous** you add a "<u>to be</u>" verb in agreement with your subject before the present participle form of a verb.
- In **future continuous** you add <u>will be</u> before the present participle form of a verb.

Continuous	I <u>was</u> taking my dog for a walk when it happened.	I <u>am</u> taking out the trash for my wife.	I <u>will be</u> taking that class next semester.

Perfect Continuous

- In **past perfect continuous** you add <u>had been</u> before the present participle form of a verb.
- In **present perfect continuous** you add a "<u>have</u>" verb in agreement with your subject + <u>been</u>, + the present participle form of a verb.
- In **future perfect continuous** you add <u>will have been</u> before the present participle form of a verb.

A **subject-verb agreement** is formed by making the subject and its verb both singular or plural. Subjects like "I, He, She, and It" are singular while subjects like "We" are plural. "You and They" are both singular and plural depending on the use. When using "They" to refer to a single person, follow the grammatical rules as if "They" were plural.
